- Matthew and Luke
- During the reign of Caesar Augustus, around the year 2 BC, the Angel Gabriel appeared to three different people
 - Zechariah
 - Mary
 - Joseph
- Factors in the dating of Jesus's birth
 - Luke 3:1: JtB began baptizing in 28/29AD
 - Luke 3:23: Jesus began ministry at about 30 years old
 - Herod the Great died in 1BC

- Mary was of the priestly clan
 - Elizabeth and Zechariah are her close relatives
- Joseph was of the Davidic line
 - Jesus is adopted into David's line, just like Augustus!
- Mary was betrothed to Joseph, apparently a good bit older than her
 - He might have been a widower with other children
- They lived in a very diverse Gentile/Jewish area around Lake Galilee
- But they were from the area around Bethlehem in the South
- They were poor, as they could only afford the sacrifice of two turtledoves.
- Joseph was a carpenter by trade

- After Gabriel appeared to Mary, she conceived by the Holy Spirit and made a journey to the region around Bethlehem to visit Elizabeth who was six months pregnant.
- She returned to Nazareth
- Later that year Augustus called for a census of the Empire that required people to travel to their ancestral homes to register for the purposes of taxation.
 - Record of this census has been lost to history
- Jesus was born in the common area of the home where the animals stayed during the night (evidence of a winter birth?)

- Forty days after his birth he was presented at the Temple in Jerusalem.
- They stayed in Bethlehem for quite some time, but were forced to leave after the visit of foreign dignitaries looking for the King of the Jews sparked the ire of Herod.
- Joseph and his family fled to Egypt just before Herod had all the boys slaughtered in the area.
- After Herod died (1 BC) the family returned from Egypt, but went straight to Galilee because Herod's son Archelaus was out to get them.

Early childhood

- The only story from Jesus' childhood is recorded in Luke 2:39-52
- The family went to Jerusalem for Passover each year.
- A large caravan of travelers would walk together. Jesus would be walking with his friends and relations and not necessarily with his parents.
- Once, when he was 12 he went into the Temple during one of these visits and was teaching the teachers, who were amazed at him. He stayed too long.
- The caravan left, but Mary and Joseph did not realize he had been left.
- They returned to Jerusalem and found him in the Temple holding forth.

Teenage years and early adulthood

• We aren't given any information in Scripture about his teenage years and early adulthood.

- There are some apocryphal stories, but they are purely legendary
- At some point during this time Joseph died, because he isn't on the scene when Jesus starts his ministry.
- Jesus worked as a carpenter and supported his mother, Mary
- They remained in Nazareth during this time

Baptism by John

- Sometime in the year 28/29 AD John son of Zechariah began to preach and baptize by the Jordan River (Luke 3:1)
- Some time after this, Jesus traveled to where John was preaching and approached him to be baptized. (Mt, Mk, Lk)
- This baptism was symbolic of Jesus ushering in a new creation.
- It also stands for his anointing as Messiah.
- Jesus' baptism marks the beginning of his ministry



Temptation in the wilderness

- After this, the synoptic gospels record Jesus being driven into the desert by the Holy Spirit to be tested.
- He fasted for 40 days in the desert
 - Moses and Elijah also did this
- At the end he was tired and hungry
- Satan tempted him three times
 - Food
 - Political power
 - Presumption/testing God
- Jesus withstood the temptations that Adam and Eve failed

First Miracle at Cana; First Sermon in Nazareth

- John 2 records the first miracle Jesus did: turning water into wine for a wedding in the town of Cana
- The celebration had run out of wine, so at his mother's request, Jesus turned an enormous amount of water into wine to bless the celebration and the young couple.
- Luke 4 records Jesus delivering his first sermon at the synagogue in Nazareth.
- He read from Isaiah 61 and preached that the prophecy referred to him.
- The people got angry and tried to kill him.



Three year itinerate ministry

- From there Jesus set out on a threeyear ministry
- He traveled from place to place, preaching a version of the Sermon on the Mount and performing miracles
- The miracles served to confirm that his teaching had authority
- He called 12 disciples to follow him and learn from him
- He had many run-ins with the religious leaders. He was masterful at answering their challenges.
- In his teachings, he claimed to be the Messiah, and even claimed to be God



- A large portion of the Four Gospels concerns narration of the final week of Jesus' life, traditionally called Holy Week
- On Sunday he triumphally entered Jerusalem riding on a donkey, a symbol of Davidic kingship
- He went into the Temple each day, teaching and challenging the leaders
- On Wednesday he was betrayed
- On Thursday he celebrated the Last Supper



- He spent the last hours of Thursday praying in the Garden of Gethsemane
- Just after midnight he was betrayed by Judas with a kiss and arrested by the Romans while exiting the garden.
- In the early hours of Friday morning, the Sanhedrin put on a hasty trial and condemned him to death for blasphemy.
- But they could not carry out the sentence. They took him to Pontius Pilate, the Roman Governor, to convince him to execute Jesus.



- Pilate questioned Jesus, but found no fault in him. He resolved to release him.
- The Judean leaders would not hear of it. They proclaimed loyalty to Caesar and demanded the crucifixion of Jesus.
- Pilate had Jesus flogged and then condemned him to death on a cross.
- Jesus was arrayed in a purple road and forced to carry the cross beam up to the hill of Calvary (Golgotha, where Goliath's skull was buried)
- On the way he stumbled, a man named Simon from Cyrene was chosen to carry the cross.



- When he arrived at Golgotha (Calvary) the Romans crucified him by nailing his hands to the cross bar and his feet to the vertical pillar.
- Mark records that Jesus was crucified at 9am on Friday.
- All three synoptics record that there was darkness over the land from noon to three PM.
 - Some think this was a solar eclipse, but all four gospels record Jesus crucifixion at Passover, and that happens just after a full moon.
- At 3PM Jesus died, a relatively quick death for crucifixion.



- His body was removed from the cross after being confirmed to be dead by a Roman soldier stabbing him with a spear in the side.
- A rich man, named Joseph of Arimathea offered his brand new tomb to bury Jesus in.
- He was wrapped in a burial shroud, but otherwise typical preparations were postponed due to impending Sabbath.
- On Saturday everyone rested as was the commandment.



Resurrection

- Early in the morning on Sunday, several of the women made their way to the tomb to perform the customary burial preparations.
- They would wash the body and apply many herbs and spices, including myrrh.
- When they arrived the found the large stone at the opening of the tomb rolled away and nothing inside.
- Two angels appeared to them and told them that Jesus was not there, but he had risen.
- The women were told to go and proclaim the news that Jesus had risen from the dead, just as he predicted.

Ascension

- Jesus appeared to his disciples many times over the period of 40 days.
- Paul records that one time he appeared to over 500 people (1 Corinthians 15:6)
- He continued to teach them and prepare them for his departure.
- 40 days after his resurrection, Jesus took the disciples to a mountain in Galilee.
- Jesus was lifted up from the mountain into the air and departed in a cloud.
- Before he left he gave the disciples the Great Commission



Later Appearances

- Jesus later appeared to a Pharisee named Saul who was persecuting Christians while on his way to Damasus.
- He saw a blinding light and saw a vision of Jesus saying, "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?"
- Saul was converted to faith in Jesus Christ and changed his name to Paul.
- Jesus also appeared to the Apostle John later in his life while he was in exile on the Island of Patmos.
- Jesus gave John messages to seven churches and visions of the future.



Return

- Before he departed, Jesus gave predictions that he would one day return.
- The apostles' also spoke of this return in their writings.
- At his return Jesus will judge evil, remove it from the world, and usher in a New Creation where there no pain, death, or sin.
- The return of Jesus is imminent, meaning it could happen at any moment, without warning.
